Services Tax (GST) concession, Fringe Benefits Tax (FBT) exemption and Income Tax exemption. BHC is also endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR).
BHC produces consolidated General Purpose Financial Statements as required by the <i>Corporations Act 2001</i> and the <i>Australian Charities and Not-for -profits Commission Act 2012</i> . BHC's financial accounts are exempt from audit by the Queensland Auditor-General. Instead, the BHC's financial accounts are independently audited by Grant Thornton Audit Pty Ltd.
In accordance with its Shareholders' Agreement, BHC must provide copies of its audited balance sheet, profit and loss account, and any other information relating to the business or financial condition of BHC to its shareholders. Each year the Queensland Treasury Corporation (QTC) is formally instructed to complete a financial viability review of BHC. QTC's findings are provided to the Minister of Housing and Public Works, and the Queensland Treasurer, in accordance with the Shareholding Protocol.
QTC's 2018 Financial Viability Review of BHC reported that BHC remains in a sound financial position.

## Remuneration

On 3 September 2018, following an assessment of the BHC Board's remuneration, in accordance with the Remuneration Procedures for part-time Chairs and Members of Queensland Government Bodies, and consultation with Brisbane City Council, Queensland Treasury and the Department of the Premier and Cabinet, the Premier approved the proposed update to BHC's remuneration arrangements.
